"To be recognized as the Air National Guard's premier Intelligence Wing, universally recognized and respected for performance and reputation." This is not only how I started my in-brief to the Inspector General, but, also my commander's call as the IG team was departing the base. Why? Because these words represent our wing vision, what drives us in our pursuit of excellence in all that we do. Our recent performance on our wing-wide Unit Compliance Inspection provided an important benchmark in that pursuit. The results from the inspection provided us additional, independent verification that we are not only on the right track, but, one of the finest wings in the ANG or USAF. In fact, the AFISRA team chief, Col Robert Spitznagel, stated at the out-brief that, "this was the best inspection that my IG team has seen in the past year", and highlighted our Operations, Security, Professionalism and Can-Do attitude as positive strengths. The ACC team was equally as impressed and expressed by Col Robert "RC" Craig, by saying, "The overall impression from my team is that the 102nd is a very strong, highly motivated and well-led organization; which is clearly evident in the presentation of the 102nd Intel Wing programs. Wing discipline is clearly reflected with a 99% overall compliance rating".

I know that at times, getting here was a challenge and appeared to be a mountain too high to climb, but, everyone chipped in and did their part knowing that outstanding results can only be achieved by a team effort and not as purely individuals. With this mindset, you have made the term "Team Otis" a continued reality. The wing overcame the challenge of the change in UCI protocol less than 30 days prior to our inspection with some units not getting checklists until 30, 15 and in some cases 7 days out from the inspection. In at least one case, the ACC IG team showed up with checklists that had yet to be published. Even so, you all maintained your composure, were highly confident in your programs and displayed the kind of professionalism that only exists in units of the

highest caliber. Although, we debated several times early in the inspection about whether to raise the "flag" with the IG over these last minute surprises, in the end you all had my fullest confidence that you had prepared well and could show the IG that the 102d doesn't let anything shake us up and we never fold. Why was I so sure? Because I told the IG team when they arrived that they would, without a doubt, find the following characteristics within the members of our wing. They were the following: A dedicated and motivated work force, coordinated processes, a commitment to compliance, a great attitude and teamwork, and leadership at all levels.

So, my hat is off to all of you for your hard work, dedication and professionalism shown to the three inspection teams from ACC, AFISRA and Global Strike Command. For a wing who has gone through a transition like we have and being three and a half years new, achieving a greater than 99% compliance rating across the three inspections could not make me more proud of the over 900 airmen and civilian employees who made this inspection such a success. It was a total team effort from start to finish. We will continue to show the Air National Guard and the U.S. Air Force that the 102nd Intelligence Wing is committed to its vision and the Air Force Core Values each and every day. We will continue to go about our business with a quiet, yet determined effort to provide our respective combatant commands with top notch airmen and civilian employees whose performance and dedication to duty is second to none. Always remember, that world class organizations can never rest on success, but must continue to be visionary, innovative and committed to continuous improvement. The 102d will continue to exemplify these important characteristics now and in the future. 102nd adds Director of Psychological Health to its ranks

In 2010, Air National Guard leaders created new, wing-level positions to provide behavioral health support to Airmen and their families.

The wing welcomes Dr. Gretchen Breyller-Hegeman as the 102nd Intelligence Wing Director of Psychological Health, or WDPH. According to Gretchen, the three main tasks of the WDPH are to promote balanced psychological health in times of increased stress,

provide comprehensive education and clinical assessments, and to be an in-house behavioral health SME [subject matter expert].

In her role as WDPH, Gretchen supports the readiness of 102nd Intelligence Wing airmen through the promotion of psychological health and resilience. Gretchen also consults with commanders regarding the psychological health of their members and units. As a member of the team of helping professionals, she supports and provides consultation to resiliency efforts, suicide prevention, traumatic stress response, and other programs supporting positive and mission-focused emotional wellbeing. She is available to provide presentations to your unit or group on a variety of

topics to enhance wellness; such as stress management, communication, conflict resolution, and relationships.

"Everyone is always welcome to make an appointment or drop by to talk," Gretchen said. She meets with airmen to provide a clinical interview and referral to local providers and other resources to address any issues hindering a member's wellbeing. With case management, Gretchen provides continuity and helps the member address any challenges in receiving services. Gretchen also collaborates with and assists with training local community providers regarding military culture, providing information relating to best practices and treatment.

Gretchen's office is co-located with the Family Readiness Program office in the wing headquarters building, 158 and she also has an office in building 197, Room 10. She can best be reached on her Blackberry, at 508-237-6652 and her email address is Gretchen.Hegeman.ctr@ang.af.mil.

Gretchen has over 25 years experience and began working with the military following her brother-in-law's death in the Pentagon on 9/11. Previously, she was the State Director of Psychological Health for the Maine National Guard where she created psychological health programs for the 101st as well as the Army Guard.

102nd COMPLIES with 99% Overall Rating

The Air Guardsmen of the 102nd Intelligence Wing are in the fight every day. They deploy to the Middle East, train at several CONUS locations, and operate a 24/7 ISR mission. Despite their rigorous schedule, Massachusetts Guardsmen were still able to prepare and pass a major inspection focusing on processes and documentation.

Representing a variety of functional areas, a team of 39 inspectors from Air Combat Command (ACC), a team of

of compliance within each functional area, and logistical planning for the actual CI inspection. Bi-weekly updates to the command staff were performed, allowing every unit to brief on their compliance status. This was the 102nd's first Compliance Inspection since its re-designation as an Intelligence Wing in 2008.

Lt. Col. Tim Gordon, Wing Inspector General, who assisted in the planning and coordination of the inspection, pointed out that "The next challenge will be to maintain an emphasis on compliance while continuing the mission after the inspection team leaves".

Mother Nature also threw a curve ball at the wing when a rare October snow storm resulted in the governor declaring a state of emergency for western Massachusetts resulting in the activation of the National Guard, including members of the 102nd Intelligence Wing.

"We took it all in stride and were able to provide important forces to the governor and aid our fellow citizens while still focusing on and completing this important inspection," said

Col Anthony Schiavi, 102nd Intelligence Wing Commander, "This clearly validates the high degree of professionalism and dedication that exists within the members of the 102d Intelligence Wing."

11 inspectors from Air Force ISR Agency (AFISRA), and 9 inspectors from the Global Strike Command came to Otis ANGB to ensure the 102nd Intelligence Wing is mission ready, which people of the unit proved beyond question.

CIs, which used to be called UCIs, are conducted to assess areas mandated by law as well as mission areas that are critical or important to the health and performance of an organization and to help standardize the way the Air Force conducts operations across the board, including active duty, Air Force Reserve and Air National Guard. The inspection was based on Air Force Instructions, local, state, federal, and Department of Defense requirements.

Leading the ACC inspection team was Col. Robert Craig. Through his experience he has found that it is an inspector's job to not just inspect and write reports, but also to teach and educate Airmen across the globe how to better do their jobs. "These inspections are a tool for commanders to provide insight and give them areas to improve on," says Craig.

During the out brief, Col. Craig expressed "The overall impression is that this is a very strong, highly motivated and well-lead organization; which is clearly evident in the presentation of the 102nd Intel Wing programs. Wing discipline is clearly reflected with a 99% overall compliance rating".

Col. Rob Spitznagel, AFISRA Team Chief, highlighted his inspection results as "the best seen by his IG team in the past year."

Preparations and logistical support started back in 2010 with a CI preparation team which had representation from every 102nd Group. Preparation included an assessment

2011 Thomas Flynn Award: TSGT Michael Adduci, 102d CES

accomplishments. He volunteered and was called to State activation for Operations Big Ice, Rising Waters, and Hurricane Irene; volunteered to become the Civil Engineer Squadron Utilities shop training NCOIC, mentored junior airmen while deployed to Fort Indiantown Gap and Silver Flag regional training sites, and is a key member of a team of civil engineers who have supported the Pan-Mass challenge for seven years running. He has also helped raise over \$5000 for a local construction worker injured and unable to work, and helps organize an annual motorcycle ride fund raiser for the Jamie A. Smith Foundation to provide financial support for his two surviving children. His accomplishments are truly outstanding!

Recently, I sat down with Tech. Sgt. Adduci to see what motivates him to do such an outstanding job. He told me that his strong desire to help others, a sense of personal gratification, and the ability to spend time with those he loves while helping others is all the motivation he needs.

As Tech. Sgt. Adduci said, "There are so many people that have greater issues than myself—such as cancer, autism, a house that has burned

down—I just want to give back as much as I can." On top of that, "It's very gratifying knowing I've helped on some kind of level, whether large or small."

One special benefit of helping others is the quality time that he's able to spend with friends and family while doing so. He and his girlfriend Christina Harrington perform many of the accomplishments together. Just ask anyone in the Civil Engineer Squadron and they'll tell you Christina and Mike are a great team who continually support military members and their community.

There's much to be said about the many selfless acts accomplished by Tech. Sgt. Michael Adduci. Please congratulate him the next time you see him on a job well done!

A New Life for Hawk found injured on Otis ANGB

It took a little convincing to get her out of the cage, but on October 21, a re-habilitated female Red Tailed hawk was released back into the wild on Otis Air National Guard Base, where she was originally found injured and unresponsive.

On September 25, 2011 the hawk was spotted on her back, unconscious, at the corner of Granville St. and Reilly St. at the telephone pole. The 102nd Security Forces Squadron responded to the call about the disabled bird and came to the scene.

Staff Sgt. David Patistea of the 102d SFS secured the area to protect the hawk which, by that time, was conscious and alert but too injured to fly. Sgt. Patistea contacted the Massachusetts Department of Environmental Protection and spoke to Sgt. Matthew Bass, a Mass. Environmental Police Officer, to find out how the bird could be best

transported to safety.

Sgt. Bass responded to the scene himself and transported the hawk to the Cape Wildlife Center, which is operated by The Humane Society in partnership with The Fund for Animals, and promotes and protects the health and well-being of native wildlife and their habitats.

"The facility did a great job bringing the hawk back from its injury and the bird is surely grateful for the helping hand" said Bass. The cause of the injury was undetermined.

"Humpty According To Grace"

I was so excited while Christmas shopping this year because this is the first year our 18 month old granddaughter will be with us for Christmas.

One of the things we bought her is a Mother Goose Nursery Rhyme book. With my children grown, this was my first glance through the book in more than two decades. I grew nostalgic reading those long forgotten poems. However, I also noticed how sad and hopeless some of the messages can be. For instance, consider Humpty Dumpty.

*Humpty Dumpty sat on a wall; Humpty Dumpty had a great fall;
All the King's horses and all the King's men cannot put Humpty Dumpty together again.*

Mother Goose depicts Humpty as an egg wearing a blue one piece suit with a red bow tie, sitting high up on a brick wall...and after?...well, if you've ever seen a dropped egg, you get the picture.

That's a sad story for a nursery rhyme. I couldn't help but wonder what caused Humpty's fall? That he "Had a great fall" describes the "results" of the fall, but not "how" he fell. Was he leaning back to far on the wall and fell by accident? Was he trying to balance too many things and he just fell? Did he jump? Was he pushed? Isn't it human nature to want to know what caused the fall? Because if we knew then we could try to avoid it, learn ways to prevent it or figure out how to minimize the damage and recover quicker. However, regardless of what caused the fall, the end result is the same, Humpty's a mess and he cannot be fixed. Things were hopeless for Humpty.

But hopelessness isn't a message I want my granddaughter to learn. Even as the military promotes resiliency, I want her to learn that early on as well.

We've all made mistakes. In a million different ways every day it's possible for us to fall off the wall so to speak, to fall short in our relationships, our families, and our work and so on. There are people who can identify with poor Humpty when something in their life felt like a broken mess. But, those times of disappointment and failure don't have to leave us or our situations hopelessly broken.

Faith tells us that we are not alone, that there is help that reaches beyond what we can do on our own. We draw strength from each other, from our faith and our understanding of God, and from


a gift that we can offer each other in the form of grace. Grace is forgiveness, undeserved favor, and unconditional acceptance. Grace gives us the ability to live a new way and a real way to help others. Through grace we remember the times we needed and received another chance, a fresh start, or a new way to deal with something. The gift of grace is another tool in building spiritual resiliency, because with grace there is hope. Our past, our mistakes and our circumstances don't have to define or defeat us! Grace has the power to accomplish the impossible, to hold things together, to restore what has been lost, to repair what has been damaged and to heal what has been hurt. In receiving grace, we are forgiven and healed and restored, and in giving grace, we are forgiven, and healed and restored. What would happen if families, neighbors, states and nations could commit to new ways of living and giving according to grace? Imagine what could happen.

So I wrote another version of Humpty Dumpty for my granddaughter. "Humpty according to grace."

"Humpty Dumpty, sat on a wall; Humpty Dumpty, indeed had a fall;

When all the kings' horses and all the kings' men came to put Humpty together again, they realized their limits and called in the king whose love and grace changed everything. Maybe not all at once or in a way they could see but they knew first hand graces mystery. They remembered their fall, and the king's intervention. So thankful they were of his gracious intention. He saved them for sure, forgave their sins too and accepted each one just as they were. They stayed there with Humpty and helped with his needs, tended his cracks with love and good deeds. They spoke such kind words and encouraged his heart, extending God's grace from the very start. Because they too had fallen and needed the king, they now had extra love to bring. They saw past the pieces strewn about where he lay, and loved him and held him while the king worked his way. Sharing the hope and good news they'd been given, they encouraged each other in a new way of living. So the next time that humpty should sit on a wall, if the wind blows just right and threatens a fall, then all the kings horse and all the kings men, will all stand together protecting their friend."

For me, this version reflects grace, offers hope and resiliency found and strengthened through faith and community and that's a message I want my granddaughter to grow up with.



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
